Annual Report Government Channel Cable Advisory Commission

December 2007

The MCAT staff has completed its first full year of broadcasting government programming from its new studio in Missoula's City Council Chambers at 140 W. Pine St.

With the oversight of the 10-member Government Channel Cable Advisory Commission, this year's government programming pioneered coverage in some new areas. MCAT covered and broadcast 174 hours of Missoula City Council meetings in 2007, more than double the hours covered in 2006, at 95 hours. Much of the increase was the result of covering committee meetings live for the first full year. Council coverage included:

- 85 hours regular City Council meetings
- 20 hours Budget Committee of the Whole
- 61.7 hours Plat, Annexation and Zoning Committee
- 29 hours Public Works Committee
- 27 hours Conservation Committee
- 21 hours Residential Safety Standards Subcommittee
- 15 hours Public Safety Committee

Committee coverage adds greatly to the body of knowledge and promotes discussion among citizens, and the meetings are rebroadcast for more exposure. That's especially important for citizens tracking issues of importance to them.

In addition, government coverage included a full year of broadcast of the Board of County Commissioners meetings.

During the past year and a half, members of the Government Channel Cable Advisory Commission have worked to diversify the commission's membership. Members now represent the University of Montana, the Missoula County Public Schools, and the elected officials of Missoula County and the City of Missoula. That has led to increased diversity in government programming as members bring their expertise in various areas to the table.

This year saw coverage of 12 South Campus Master Plan public meetings held by the University of Montana Expanded school programming included, in addition to coverage of the school board, committee meetings on Curriculum and Instruction, Personnel, Negotiations and Policy.

Government coverage is not limited to meetings. It now includes public forums presented by City Club Missoula, the Missoula Downtown Association's Parade of Lights, the Missoula Cemetery's "Stories and Stones" day, the 2007 Historic Preservation Awards, Missoula City Band concerts and the Pineview Park redesign. See the annotated report for details.



MCAT staff also produced a high-production-value video about the proposed reconstruction of Hillview Way. Ron Scholl worked with staff from the City Communications Office and the city-county Office of Planning and Grants to produce an 18-minute movie about the challenges presented by Missoula's increasing housing prices.

The Missoula City Attorney's office monitors customer complaints about Bresnan service that cannot be resolved by Bresnan Cable's customer service department. In the time period covered by this report, November 2006 through November 2007, there were no such complaints made to the City Attorney's Office, the Mayor's Office or the City Clerk's Office.

One of MCAT's prime directives in its government coverage is its charge to remain neutral in public life and balanced in its coverage. The advisory body helps guide its work by advising and making recommendations.

The Government Channel Cable Advisory Commission looks forward to another year of guiding MCAT's government coverage as an integral part of free speech and information in Missoula.

Stories and Stones 2007

This year's program includes historic resurrections of the three men who founded Missoula, and the infamous Madam of Front Street, Mary Gleim. Dr. Robert Brown portrays Captain Christopher Higgins, Kim Kauffman portrays Mary Gleim. Automobile and aviation developer H.O. Bell is featured this year. New elements include music by the Old Time Fiddlers, blacksmiths demonstrating original techniques and Glacial Lake Missoula history. During the program, volunteers tell over 30 stories about Missoula.

MCAT moved into the new council chambers in November 2006 and has covered about 85 hours of council meetings in the report period.

2007 Historic Preservation Awards

This program is a record of the 17th Annual Historic Preservation Awards given by the Missoula Historic Preservation Commission. The award ceremony was combined with a meeting of the Missoula City Club. Dean McGovern introduces Commission Chair Cynthia Manning who turns it over to Philip Maechling. Philip is the Historic Preservation Commission officer who has a deep knowledge of Missoula’s architectural history. Philip described some architectural treasures in the City and in Milltown that lack protected



status. The awards given to various Missoulians for their contribution to historic preservation include Michael & Gloria Wegener for residential addition, Jay LaFlesch for the downtown LaFlesch building restoration. Mayor's Office

Affordable Housing in Missoula interviews.

MCAT's Ron Scholl worked with city employees to collect interviews from various local residents regarding the impacts of high housing costs on average Missoulians. Ron interviewed over 20 people for the project. The people include experts in the area of finance, development and housing, and ordinary area people who are searching for a home to call their own. The program will be edited by a third party contractor. Members of the project work team included Ginny Merriam, Communications Officer, City of Missoula, Nancy Harte Grants Administrator at the Office of Planning and Grants, and Mike Barton, Director of Urban Initiatives. Mayor John Engen provides the narration for the program. The interviewees include Missoula resident Rosalie Cates, Fire Chief Tom Steenberg, Police Chief Rusty Wickman, Andrea Davis of Missoula Housing Authority.

Focus on Affordability Forum

The forum's centerpiece is the presentation of a new report, "2006 Analysis of Impediments to Affordable Housing Choice." The author of the report, Robert M. Gaudin of Western Economic Services, Inc. discusses its findings. Mayor John Engen makes introductory remarks, and Missoula's county commissioners also take part in the conversation following the presentation.

Comments from the elected officials and the public will be used to shape the City's housing policies as it moves forward. 105 minutes, inventory 106417.

Real Change, Not Spare Change Press Conference



The press conference features Dan Cederberg, President of the Business Improvement District. Dan introduces the concerns of the Downtown Association regarding aggressive panhandling and the function of the BID non-profit organization. Mayor John Engen joins Mr. Cederberg in encouraging Missoulians to refrain from encouraging



street hand-outs and to pledge money to non-profit organizations working with issues of homelessness, joblessness, and chemical dependency. In attendance at the conference is Police Chief Rusty Wickman, who also speaks to the issue, and the Director of The Poverello, Ellie Hill.



West Broadway Charrette Meetings

Brian Scott of MIG presented aspects of the public input process to form the Broadway Corridor Master Plan. Two meetings were held in January of 2007 that presented summaries of concerns for the future of the roadway. Public input is recorded at both meetings.

Office of Neighborhoods

Community Forum

The Neighborhood Council system encourages participation of citizens in the governance process, providing a mechanism for them to convene regularly on a neighborhood basis and giving expression to their concerns and interests through regular reports to the City government, including minority reports by dissenters. Leadership teams are encouraged to “build opportunities for neighborhood communication, neighborhood-initiated projects, interaction, and problem-solving.” The Community Forum is the monthly meeting of the Neighborhood Council system and typically meets the fourth Thursday of each month, 26 hours.



“City Talk” discussion with Nick Roberts & Stacey Rye on “What’s Up Missoula?”

City Talk is an online tool for gathering public comment on issues affecting the city of Missoula. City Talk issues may be generated by the public or city officials. Appropriate issues may range from general topics to special events to policy considerations. While City Talk is not a scientific survey tool, all responses will be tabulated and posted on the Office of Neighborhoods Web site. Nick Roberts from the Office of Neighborhoods and Stacey Rye of City Council Ward 3 came to MCAT studios to talk about the possibilities for this new communication initiative, and explain to the public how the survey mechanism would work.



Office of Planning and Grants

Board of Adjustment Meeting in May 2007

In order to show the diversity of City of Missoula functions, MCAT will present the work of the 23 boards and commissions that work with city administration. This Board of Adjustment meeting demonstrates how citizens appeal for variances, or exceptions to particular zoning ordinances. The variances are granted provided the applicant show significant hardship and minimum negative impact.



Crime Victim Advocates

Chantelle Gaynor and Michelle Staser gave an overview the work Crime Victims performs on behalf of Missoula area resident who are victims of violent crimes. They also highlighted events taking place during Domestic Violence Awareness Month. 25 minutes, What's Up Missoula folder.

Parking Commission

Informational Meeting on Downtown Parking.



This meeting was held in council chambers in early March 2007 and was moderated by Geoff Badenoch. The parking commissioners discussed problems with parking enforcement in the downtown and proposed an increase in the fines. The proposal was met with much discussion by attendees, many of whom were concerned that the increased fine would adversely impact businesses in the downtown area. 123 minutes, inventory 106429.

Public Hearing on Parking Fees.

The Missoula Parking Commissioners heard more feedback from downtown merchants concerned that a change in the parking fee structure would scare away potential customers. Discussion revolved around how to prevent parking offenders from paying small parking fines and continuing to abuse the metered parking system. 82 minutes, inventory 106448.

Dennis Burns, Parking Consultant.

Mr. Burns is an expert in parking problem solving, with a national reputation for solid understanding of parking issues facing small downtown communities. He provided the Missoula Parking Commission, The Missoula City Council, and the Missoula general public with a presentation on establishing a downtown master plan for parking that would address the problems of parking turn-over and enforcement management systems. Additionally, Mr Burns provided a look at the many technological advances in the area that offer choices for many different future direction in parking design and control. 118 minutes, inventory 106584.

Intense Summer Heat Tree Watering with Scott Stringer, Urban Forester.

December 2006 Harry Fritz: “Modern Montana History and Future Trends”



Abe Abramson introduced the well-known UM history professor Harry Fritz. Fritz has been using a talent for public address to regal the Montana Legislature with historic figure recreations which bring to life contemporary issues through historic understanding. Fritz is himself in this address, but he brings to life recent economic hard time in Montana, beginning with the locally felt depression in the 1980's. There is a lively question and answer period from the audience which touches on issues of resource to amenity economic models and the pressures of energy demand on ecological values. 65 minutes, inventory 106232.

January 2007 Rock Creek Development

John Menson, President of the Rock Creek Preservation Association politely contrasts his view of the proposed Rock Creek subdivision with Alan McCormick, attorney for the developers company, The Ranch at Rock Creek. The proposed development, sited at the confluence of Rock Creek and The Clark Fork River raised immediate environmental concerns among local residents. City Club presented the issue to inform members on land use regulations and the process of land use decision making.

Paul Ritter, Director of Fine Arts for the Missoula County Public Schools is also a member of the nonprofit Missoula Community Performing Arts Center. The organization has plans to develop a performing art center on southwest corner of Orange & Front Streets. Paul brought drawings and models to the City Club and discussed the need for the facility and the use the school system and ordinary citizens would derive from the completed structure. 57 minutes, inventory 106445.



May 2007 “Missoula Public Schools, 2007 and the Future”

Presentation by Missoula County Public Schools Superintendent Jim Clark about his perspective on the our local school system. Dr Clark contrasts the administration of schools in Montana compared to Wyoming where he worked before. Dr Clark also explains the particular structure of Missoula County Public Schools Board oversight. At the end of his talk, he offers insight on population trends in Missoula and the likely impact of diminishing students on our local schools. 54 minutes, inventory 106499.



June 2007 “Future of Bicycling in Missoula”.

This program features 5 minutes presentations from 4 different representatives of bicycle and pedestrian issues in Missoula. City Club Board Member Alex Taft introduces Bob Giordano of MIST, Jim Sayer from Adventure Cycling, Dave Shaw, City of Missoula Trail Manager from Parks & Recreation and John Weyrich of the Montana Bicycle Racing Association. 63 minutes, inventory 106555.

July 2007 “The Little Truck and The Missoula Children’s Theatre,”

Don Collins, the Senior Development Officer and Co-Founder of MCT joined with Executive Director Michael McGill to introduce a documentary film about the wide scope of MCT’s services in the world for children actors. MCT provides school and social clubs with performer/director/teachers in all 50 states and in 14 countries across the globe. Don gave an informal history of the growth of MCT and ways in which Missoula helped bring about the success of this world renowned nonprofit arts organization. 57 minutes, inventory 106615.



August 2007

September 2007 “Hunger in Missoula: Connecting Local Issues with National Policy,” Bonnie Buckingham, Program Operation Manager of The Missoula Foodbank gave an overview of the Foodbank’s service and funding structure. She acknowledged many local businesses which contributed to the success of the Missoula Foodbank, which now distributes food to about 1,000 households a month. 54 minutes, inventory 106623.

October 2007

The topic for discussion of this City Club Missoula forum is the Russell Street/South 3rd Street Transportation Project. Russell Street is one of Missoula’s busiest roads. But its old farm-to-market model doesn’t meet the needs of modern Missoula. The Russell Street Bridge is the last bridge carrying motorized traffic over the Clark Fork River with only two lanes. Missoula Director of Public Works Steve King and HKM Engineering Project Engineer Jennifer James presented an overview of the project and answered questions: What will the new Russell Street look like? When will the first dirt be moved? What’s taking so long? City officials appear in the program to answer questions.



Missoula County Commissioner Meetings

MCAT began covering County Commissioner Meetings under the direction of the Government Channel Advisory Commission. The meetings take place in the middle of day in the middle of the week. The meetings replay twice a week on the MCAT Civic Channel. 72 hours of meetings were covered in this report period – almost as many hours as City Council meetings.

The University of Montana



South Campus Master Plan, University of Montana. The University of Montana attempted to engage Missoula residents in plans for the development of land that has been used for track fields, gardens and golfing in the area at the intersection of South Ave and South Higgins Street. The South Campus Master Plan Committee is comprised of UM administrators, students, and representatives of the city neighborhood

councils adjacent to South Campus. The committee is chaired by Administration & Finance Associate Vice President Rosi Keller. MCAT was requested to telecast the majority of meetings which were held to create a framework on which future building could be developed. The meetings of July 10 and 18th included public presentation of the plan on the University of Montana campus.
